

Southern Lights Rally Lights Up Central Southland

The Southern Lights Rally made a popular return to the south in late June, lighting up the roads with some fantastic racing over two days.

The rally is a reincarnation of the old Southland Rally, which was last held as a national championship round about 20 years ago. The rally started in Pebbly Hills Forest on Friday 21 June, with the rally cars all needing extra lights so the drivers could see when racing in the dark. Saturday 22 June started in the dark between Dolamore Park and Benmore. A service was held in Winton before three stages at Forest Hill, Jewitt Road and Hokonui. Another service park was held in Winton before the cars travelled to Western Southland to complete the four stages there, with another service park in Tuatapere. The last stage was held at Teretonga.

Mark McMillan (driver - Invercargill) and Tim Driscoll (co-driver - Winton) were competing in a Subaru Impreza STI. Being locals was an advantage, claiming a fourth overall over the Forest Hill Stage, only four seconds off eventual overall winner and former World Rally Championship driver Hayden Paddon.

Unfortunately on Jewitt Road, they slipped off the road and got stuck, losing around six minutes of time while spectators pushed them back on.

It was impressive to see an incredible amount of support on the stages from people all over the province. Spectator points were often jam packed and there was often people videoing cars between the stages. The service parks in Winton were also well attended.

VetSouth preparing to celebrate 20 years in Winton

VetSouth in Winton celebrates its 20th anniversary later this month.

Back then, it was still Central Southland Vet Services, and was still housed in a converted house in Moore Rd. CSVS had expanded over the previous years with the dairy growth and new vets arriving, and what was a fine clinic for four vets was no longer fine for eight vets and an increased number of support staff!

So, with a great leap of faith, owners Andrew Roe and Mark Bryan took the step into the unknown, and purchased the current site on Welsh Rd. They developed a plan for a large, 1300m2 building that could house up to 12 vets and had two separate operating theatres, a decent car park, and even was complete with a large retail space. Remember the separate old shop Jim used to have on the main street?!

There were plenty of challenges. The site had been the old Winton dump, and so a lot of remedial work was necessary before building could even be started. The cost was extortionate or seemed so in those days - and in fact as Director Mark Bryan says 'we're still paying it off!' And of course Jim was reluctant to share his precious retail shop with 'a bunch of young bloody vets'.

But their perseverance paid off, and 20 years later, the building has been expanded twice more. It now houses over 20 vets and around 50 total staff on any one day, making it probably the largest employer in Winton.



It's become VetSouth, as it merged with the Gore Vets in 2006. And in fact, the larger VetSouth entity has spread its wings across other areas of rural New Zealand too - but it's still fully locally owned.

Mark continues: "Alongside our vets we've now got an army of vet technicians - something we'd never imagined 20 years ago. Our nurse and companion animal teams have grown to fill what we thought would be a massive space for pets. And we have a fantastic support team alongside the clinical teams that make sure that everything stays running well and keeps the vets under control. Even Jim is happy!"

He adds: "We can only do what we do because of the support of the local community - and we all feel privileged to be able to live and work here. We've got an international team but they've all made their home in Southland and we want to be here for at least another 20 years - when we might finally have paid it off!"

These are challenging times, Southland/Murihiku

Southland District Council is consulting on its Long Term Plan 2024-2034, and needs to hear from you.

How much do you think Council should spend? Are you prepared to sacrifice some levels of service in roading to keep rates down?

These vital decisions will have a bearing on your final rates.

The average Southland district rate increase for 2024/2025 in the proposed LTP is 13.66%, with most increases across the district ranging from 4% to 13% for residential rates, and from 11% to 17% for rural and business rates. There will be exceptions for individual properties.

There are four key issues, around funding of water services, roads, recycling and Te Anau Airport Manapouri.

The consultation period runs from 5 June until 5 July, with hearings scheduled on 16-18 July. Please go to https://makeitstick.nz/ltp2024 and let Council know what you think.

Hard copies of the consultation document and submission form are available at Southland District Council's office/libraries in Invercargill, Winton, Riverton, Te Anau, Lumsden, Otautau, Oban, and Wyndham, as well as more than 20 cafes, dairies, supermarkets, retail outlets, pubs, clubs or service centres in townships throughout the district.
