Everest Base Camp fundraiser

Local woman Kathy Wilson is preparing to embark on the challenge of a lifetime, all to fundraise as much as she can for Orphans Aid International.

This month, Kathy will join the 20 year celebrations of the organisation, trekking to Everest Base Camp to raise awareness and make a mountain of difference for orphans throughout the world.

The adventure will include 12 days of trekking over 131km, with an altitude of 5364m. Kathy will join 16 Kiwis and one Canadian for the journey, spending four days in Kolkata, India, first to visit some of the projects Orphans Aid International supports, then flying to Lukla to start the trek.

Orphans Aid International works to rescue children from abusive and unsafe situations and to place them into loving families or homes.

As I type another winter blast bears down on Southland and I, like everyone else, think we are well overdue for some sun. Just like the seasons, policing demand has its up and downs. August and September are traditionally good months for Western Southland policing with everybody busy calving and lambing; working long hours leaves very little time for getting into trouble. It also means farmers are out and about and around sheds in the early hours leaving little opportunity for criminals to commit offences. With the end of spring and as we get into summer we get into our worst months for offending with calls for service or demand peaking in December and January. These are our worst months of the year with high numbers of offences including burglaries, drink driving, mental health, and family harm occurrences.

Knowing the demand is coming, Police up the deterrence work, with increased checkpoints and rural patrols. I prefer a prevention approach as I would rather prevent you becoming a victim or statistic than have to attend one. Preventing a crime or not becoming a road statistic starts with you. Security is key to stopping your property being stolen. Basically, criminals are lazy and opportunistic and the harder we make it for them to walk onto your property and clean out your shed or steal from your unlocked car the less likely they are to try. Good locks, good lighting, and valuable items out of sight is the first step. We have lots of additional security advice on the Police website or pop into the station if you want to know more.

As the days heat up we tend to do a bit more socialising. If you're an employer planning on a shout or just having a beer with a mate, the first thing on the prevention list is a safe way to get home. Plan a way home before you crack the first beer, and you won't have an issue with the many checkpoints we are planning through the summer.

Every weekend between now and Christmas, three or four locals will be caught drink driving with the same excuses - "I only had a couple" and "I had no other way to get home". If you have had a big night on the beers remember it takes 12 hours for alcohol to work its way out of your system. Remember the mantra "12 hours from bottle to throttle" and you can't go wrong.

The last thing on my prevention list is that every year after this busy time we have drivers falling asleep behind the wheel or driving on auto pilot. Fatigue is a major contributor to our road toll and working long hours on long sunny drives never ends well. If you are tired, pull over and if travelling on a long weekend get plenty of sleep before you travel.

On the staffing front we have local constable Tyler Hamilton starting at the Winton station in early November. Tyler has been policing in Queenstown and Invercargill and, being a local born and bred, has a real passion for the Winton community. He will be a great addition to our team. Look out for him and say hello.

Boys basketball team SI champions


The CSC boys basketball team beat St Kevins 94-71 to win the South Island title, and earn a place at nationals.
