New Limehills principal embracing the rural life

New Limehills principal Simon Thomas – known as Mr. T – has quickly made his mark, with his red bands firmly planted in the heart of the community.

After over 10 years as a principal in East Christchurch, Simon and his wife Amanda moved south in late 2024. Drawn by the community-focused nature of the Limehills principal role, the rural setting, and the chance to make a positive impact, Simon has quickly felt at home. "It's an awesome community. Everyone has been really supportive, and we've got fantastic staff. But the best part is definitely the kids. They're capable, engaged, and a lot of fun," he said. "There's great family support here, we're all working together and we're all on the same page."

Term 1 has been busy with BikeWise Week, the school triathlon, athletics day, and swimming, while Term 2 promises more excitement, including school camps and cross country.

With the support of his dedicated staff, Simon has worked to refresh the school curriculum, integrating the local environment and community. Classes are now grouped into teams: Lambsworth, honouring the school farm and local community, Kōwhai, reflecting the school's connection to Kōwhai Reach, and Forest, inspired by the school's popular 'forest school' excursions. Themed learning opportunities including harvest, beef and dairy, and sheep; connecting with the local community.

Though new to rural life, Simon is embracing it – including his bike commute to school, now surrounded by cows instead of cars.

The school will welcome two new teachers in Term 2 – Kerri Brand and Janelle McCallum - and in more exciting news, a new entrant class will open midyear, bringing the school back to eight classrooms. To learn more about Limehills School visit the new website <u>www.limehills.school.nz</u>

Crabs, touch tanks and cockle shell voting were all part of the Aquavan fun in Winton in March. Over 150 students, teachers and parents from seven local schools joined the University of Otago Marine Studies Centre Team, supported by Environment Southland and Thriving Southland, and became scientists for two hours, learning that what we do on the land affects our rivers, estuaries and seas.

Through interactive, hands-on sessions students discovered how their catchments, rivers, and coasts are all connected. The touch tank full of marine creatures was the star of the show, closely followed by the crabs. The cockle shell voting was a great way to end the sessions, with each student deciding how they would spend their cockle shell money to look after our land and water if they were the government.

Over 200 people came to the Winton community session amazing! The fantastic St Andrews Scout Group from Otautau made a special trip to join us as their national theme is marine this term. It was so much fun!

Many thanks to Environment Southland who led the funding and organising of this programme, the amazing University of Otago Aquavan team, the Central Southland Presbyterian Church for a great venue, and the Mid Oreti Catchment Group who got funding to help make the Winton sessions happen and donated two native plants from their Mid Oreti Mini Forest Movement Project to each school to support their planting projects of their special places.

We hope schools are inspired to explore different ways they can help look after the environment. Don't forget your local Catchment Group, community groups and schools are welcome to borrow the four Thriving Southland Education Kits – How healthy is your stream? How healthy is your estuary? Solving the animal pest puzzles and Growing native plants.

New astro turf a winner at Winton School

Winton School pupils can now get outside and play yearround, thanks to the installation of a large section of SmartGrass right in the middle of the school.

The new astro turfed area was first suggested by the school's PTA, who wanted to ensure pupils could play outside regardless of the weather. The idea resonated with the school Board and staff, who saw the value in being able to encourage kids to get outdoors and be active in their break times year-round.

Thanks to a \$15,000 grant from Community Trust South, and financial support from the school's PTA and Board, and after much research, Christchurch company SmartGrass were enlisted to undertake the \$120,000 project, which involved clearing the space, laying the foundations, sorting drainage, and laying the turf.

Already, it's made a significant and positive difference.

"The astro turf is really fun to play games on like Seaweed and Everybody's In and a whole lot of games," commented Aris Van Miltenburg, 9. "The whole purpose of it was so we don't get muddy shoes."

"I think it's pretty good because on wet days you can still play on it, because the water soaks through," said Izzy Jenkins, 9. "I play on the astro turf every lunch time, and it's also nice to just sit on and talk."

The new turf has a lifespan of between 10 and 15 years, with proper maintenance, meaning hundreds of Winton School kids are set to benefit over the years ahead. Live Alone Lunch


